CHAPTER IV

CONCLUSION

The study entitled From Immaturity to Maturity: The Development of the Main Character's Characterizations in Ernest Hemingway's Novel A Farewell to Arms has two purposes, namely to analyze the main character's immaturity and maturity in Ernest Hemingway's novel A Farewell to Arms. Library research including internet browsing is done to form conceptual models based on the related studies. The conceptual models, then, is used to formulate immaturity and maturity of the main character, namely Frederic Henry. The data corpus of this thesis includes all of the phrases, clauses, sentences, and discourses which have relation with the Immaturity and maturity of the main character in Ernest Hemingway's Novel A Farewell to Arms.
