## CHAPTER V CONCLUSION

Relation is connection between or among the words which is defined in terms of how its members combine with the other word. Lexical itself may be in the form of the others. Lexical relations are the relation of words determined by meaning form, namely synonymy, homonymy, antonymy, polysemy, and hyponymy.

This thesis applied descriptive in nature to analyze the data. The total number of data are 90 words, existing in 83 sentences.

There are 90 sentences which contain lexical relations within them. The data analysis shows that lexical relations include as synonymy are 11 (24,44%), as homonymy are 12 (26,67%), as antonymy are 16 (35,56%), as polysemy is 1 (2,22%) and hyponymy are 12 (26,67%). While, the percentages on the use of those data are the following, use as noun 35 (38,89%), use as verb 14 (15,56%), use as adverb 9 (10%), use as adjective 23 (25,55%), and using function word 9 (10%).
