CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION

This thesis' problems are about the forms of magical terms used in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, the meanings of magical terms used J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, and the kinds of meaning of magical terms found in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*. The objectives of this thesis are to describe the forms of magical terms used in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, to describe the meanings of magical terms used J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, and to describe the kinds of meaning of magical terms found in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*. The data of magical terms in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*. The data of magical terms in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone* are 20 data, that is, in sentence form was taken from a novel entitled "*Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*" that was written by J.K. Rowling.

In J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone* there are three kinds of class of word that are used. From 20 magical terms data that is analyzed, there are 18 data (90%) categorized as nouns with different classification of noun. They consist of 3 proper nouns, 9 concrete nouns, 6 abstract nouns. The other data categorized as verb is only found in 1 datum (5%), and adjective is only found in 1 datum (5%) only. Therefore, from the data analysis, it seems that noun is more frequent used than the other form of

part of speech. In determining whether that magical terms belongs to noun, verb, adjective, etc, we must know the function of the terms in sentences.

The meaning of magical terms used in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter* and the *Philosopher's Stone* consists of specific terms with specific meaning and general terms with specific meaning. The following is general terms that used in this novel; wounded dog, means manner to express something. The next, specific terms that used in this novel that is, *Muggles*, means a group of people who does not believe in magic and belong to common people.

In analyzing the kinds of meaning in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, the writer classifies the kinds of meaning into two categories; they are denotative meaning and connotative meaning. From 20 magical terms data that are analyzed, there are 15 data (75%) that have connotative meaning. The other data categorized into denotative meaning, there are 5 data (25%). It means that connotative meaning is more dominant in magical terms that found in J.K. Rowling's *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*. In understanding the text, we are expected not only to understand the literal meaning of the text but we have to understand the meaning of magical terms as well.
